2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's gospel, John the Baptist is inviting us to look at Jesus. He calls Jesus the 'lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world'. We hear these words often in our liturgies and today we are invited to meditate on them more closely. In Jesus' time, two lambs were sacrificed if individuals needed to perform an act of ritual purity. John refers to Jesus as the lamb of God because he knows that for Jesus living and preaching a love that was and still is radical for many will involve suffering, even death, at the hands of the systems that he challenges.

Sin is a word we are not fond of these days, and for good reason, but one definition of 'sin' is a 'broken relationship', between people and themselves, people and the world and between people and God. We are not short of situations in our world where this is reality: poverty, greed, violence, war, hunger, unjust economic systems, and even ecological sin. In 2019, at a Vatican conference on 'Criminal Justice and Corporate Business', Pope Francis stated that 'ecological sin' would be included in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. He said that ecological sin 'manifests itself in acts and habits of pollution and destruction of the harmony of the environment'. He included 'ecocide', the massive contamination of air, land and water resources, the wide scale destruction of biodiversity and 'any action capable of producing an ecological disaster or destroying an ecosystem'.

The 'sins of the world' are all around us, but so are those who strive to 'take away' these sins. Jesus' immense love is not a passive love; he does not accept that sin and death will have the final say, yet he comes with the gentleness of a lamb. Today's gospel invites us to look at the lamb of God, actively easing the world's suffering. When we hear these words, may we be reminded of all those who sacrifice much to ease the sufferings of others. This is Christ, the 'lamb of God' active and present in our here and now.
