Fourth Sunday of Lent

John 9:1-41

Today's gospel is long but so worth it. John's narrative is enticing and reads like a piece of theatre, so much so in fact, some scholars think it may actually have been acted out, as it has such clear roles and great one-liners. In the first part we see that the disciples are not really interested in helping the man born blind, they are more concerned with solving the riddle of whose fault it is that he is blind in the first place. Is it divine retribution? Jesus is clear that no one is to blame. God is not vengeful. Jesus focuses on what good God can do through difficult situations. They present an opportunity for God's love and grace to work, not an opportunity for condemnation.

One really interesting thing to notice in the story is how the man's vision increases as the story unfolds. It's not only his physical sight that returns, but spiritually he begins to see more and more clearly, despite being faced with fierce opposition from the authorities. In contrast to this clarity, the opposite is happening for the religious leaders. They appear to become even more blind as the story hurtles towards its climax. Those in authority object to the man's newfound vision. While Jesus disappears for most of this narrative, the blind man takes centre stage and grows from seeing Jesus as a prophet, to a man of God and finally to worshipping him.

There are times in our own lives when we need greater clarity. Perhaps we are having difficulties with friends or family members and long to share with them on a deeper level but find it too difficult. We plead with the Lord for greater awareness on how to approach them, knowing that we, too, may face opposition and difficult questioning. At those moments Jesus can certainly seem absent. It is often at these moments of aloneness that Jesus appears. There are many things that we are blind to. We all suffer from some sort of spiritual blindness. Today, let us pray for greater clarity and awareness so that we, like the blind man may come to see more clearly.
