Farewell to Fr. Shane

When Bart O'Sullivan left Cill Chiaráin in 1973, aged 16, for building work in England and 3 years later emigrated to the U.S. he could never have envisaged a situation where, 38 years later, his son, now Fr. Shane, born bred and educated in the U.S. would become Parish Priest of Carna, his father's birthplace. To appreciate how this unlikely occurrence could take place you would need to understand something of Fr. Shane's way of thinking. For him, the most powerful relationship in his life is his relationship with God and his openness to what he discerns and believes that God is asking of him. When he answered the call to the priesthood he could have stayed in the familiar environs of his own home Diocese yet he discerned a call, like that of Abraham, our father in faith to: "Leave your father's house and go to a land that I will show you". And came, as he said, on mission here in the Archdiocese of Tuam. He came to a country of sharply declining church practice and an almost complete absence of vocations to the priesthood, a very challenging mission indeed.

He has risen to that challenge for the past ten years in the busy parishes of Tuam and Castlebar with strong commitment and endless enthusiasm. Now, he prepares to leave the familiar environs of Castlebar where he has been an invaluable part of the Parish Team, a much loved priest and effective minister especially to the young people of the parish and far beyond. He goes to a very different but no less challenging environment as the only priest in a rural community whose native language is not his own. Once again, he does so in the strong belief that this is where God is guiding him and responding with his usual generosity of spirit.

I like to claim that I played a very minor role in Fr. Shane's faith journey on his first visit to the Archdiocese. I took him on a trip to Clonmacnoise and discovered, to my delight, that he actually came from Brainerd, Minnesota, the setting of one of my all-time favourite movies – Fargo – home of the unforgettable Marge Gunderson and husband Norm. After that, Shane could do no wrong in my eyes! Seriously though, I have always admired and often been inspired by Fr. Shane's unshakeable faith, his generosity of spirit, his principled stand on issues he considered vital (even if we did not always agree on them), his clarity of thought and ability to preach with that same clarity and conviction, his reverent celebration of Mass and the other sacraments, his constant focus on evangelisation – especially of the young, his unfailing good humour, his genuine compassion for those in need of help – spiritual and material, his ability to cope cheerfully with the myriad demands on his time and energy. Is it any wonder we will miss his presence among us?

I have little doubt that the good people of Carna, my neighbouring parish, will welcome him as one of their own. They will admire his courage and understand his inevitable difficulties in being the youngest Parish Priest in a Gaeltacht parish. We wish him every blessing for the future and we thank him for the gift he has been to us in Castlebar for the past 5 years.
