## Fifth Sunday of Lent

The Old Testament law demanded that those caught in the act of adultery should be put to death. In today's gospel, we hear about a woman who has been arrested by the religious leaders and dragged before Jesus. There is no mention of her partner – he may have been one of her accusers or a friend of theirs, but we are not told. This woman is being used by these men to trap Jesus as he teaches in the Temple precincts. Displaying the characteristics of a mob mentality, they want to judge, condemn and even kill her. Jesus does not condemn the woman, of course, but a key piece of this passage draws attention to his demeanour. In the face of the fierce aggression of the mob, Jesus embodies a radical humility and remains calm.

We live in a stone-throwing society, one that cares little for the circumstances that lead people into their particular situations. We want someone to blame, and the sooner the better. If you watch the news, you will see the blame game in process daily. The mob mentality is contagious and often lazy, because it is the easy option when faced with complex circumstances. Those who accuse others often do so because they find inward reflection too difficult. Here, Jesus encourages the religious leaders out of the mentality and back to their own reality: 'Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her'.

Everyone makes mistakes, and we all need forgiveness from time to time. As we approach the Easter season, remember that Jesus can and wants to free us from these burdens and invites us to start again each time. This gospel also challenges us to relate compassionately to others. It is in this way that we can rediscover our common humanity.
